**Medicines supply** to Balochistan's only cancer hospital stopped

QUETTA: Medicines supply under the Balochistan Endowment Fund (BEF) to Balochistan's only cancer hospital was stopped, doctors and patients said. For the last two months, the hospital is not getting medicines under the BEF, Dr. Feroz Khan Achakzai, a senior doctor of the CENAR hospital Daily Quetta Voice.

#### 100 cancer patients

Daily, over 100 cancer patients are coming and they go back in frustration without getting medi-cines, Mr. Achakzai said. The cancer disease continues to spread in Balochistan and it has claimed scores of precious human lives during the last few years. "I sold jew-elry and everything to buy medi-cines for my ailing wife", Bahauddin 47, a white-bearded man from Balochistan's Dalbandin

area told this scribe.

Dozens of cancer patients and their attendants were waiting outside the reception of the CENAR hospital to get the official medicines. However, the hospital administration informed that the administration informed that the stock of the medicines was finished two months back and there was not

"Registering more than 8000 new cancer patients"



"We are registering more than 8000 new cancer patients every year", Dr. Achakzai informed. He said that cur-rently, more than 2,000 cancer patients were under treatment at the Bolan Medical Complex Hospital and the CENAR hos-

The patients complain about costly cancer medicines. "I am spending more than Rs.50,000 per month for my medicines", Hidayatullah, a young man with a bushy beard lamented. He said that he spent all his money and belongings to huy money and belongings to buy the costly cancer medicines to

save his life.
In CENAR hospital, most of the patients belong to the downtrodden class since middle-class and elite-class people go to Karachi or the Shaukat Khanum memorial hospital in Lahore for medical treatment. "We have no money to go to Lahore and Karachi", Hidayatullah said.

Despite repeated attempts, Quetta Voice was not able to speak to the officials to get their point of view about stopping the medicines to the only cancer Balochistan

# ECC okays up to 124% gas tariff hike to unlock IMF loan

ISLAMABAD: The Economic Coordination Committee (ECC) of the Cabinet Monday approved up to 124% hike in the tariff of gas across the board for six months to implement a major prior condition set by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) for striking a staff-level agreement with Pakistan.

The finance ministry in a statement.

The finance ministry, in a statement, said the Ministry of Energy (Petroleum Division) tabled a summary on natural gas sale pricing for FY2023 and presented tariff proposals for all consumer categories in accordance with the Review of Estimated Revenue Requirement (RERR) for the fiscal year 2022-23.

"The ECC after detailed discussion approved gas price revision proposal for domestic, commercial and power sectors

domestic, commercial and power sectors for six months [January to June, 2023]," the statement mentioned.

Reforms in the energy sector and con-



trolling the circular debt remained on top of the agenda during the talks held with the IMF mission that concluded 10-

with the IMF mission that concluded 10-day parleys in Islamabad last Thursday.

The IMF team left Islamabad without signing an agreement and asked Pakistan to take corrective measures.

For households consuming up to 100 cubic metres of gas, the rate has been hiked by 16.6% to Rs350 per MMBTU, an increase of Rs50 per MMBTU. For domestic consumers who utilise 200 cubic metres, the rate has been increased by 32% to Rs730 per MMBTU.

A 69% hike in tariff has been given go-ahead for consumers of up to 300 cubic metres of gas, and it will now cost them Rs1,250 per MMBTU. For domestic consumers utilising gas up to 400 cubic metres, the rate has been hiked by 99% to Rs2,200 per MMBTU.

For households using more than 400

cubic metres of gas, the rate has been hiked by 124% to Rs3,277 per MMBTU. After a 28.6% hike, the gas price for commercial consumers has been increased from Rs 1,283 per MMBTU to Rs 1,650 per MMBTU. The price of gas for the power sector has been increased from Rs857 per MMBTU to Rs1,050 per MMBTU following an increase of 22.8%. For the export industry, after a 34% hike, the rate has been hiked up to Rs1,100 per MMBTU. The CNG sector will have to pay Rs1,800 per MMBTU following a hike of 31%. After an increase of 46%, the fertiliser sector will be provided gas at Rs1,500 per MMBTU. The cement sector will pay Rs1,500 per MMBTU following an increase of 17.46% in the gas price. Meanwhile, the cabinet committee also allowed the Ministry of Economic Affairs for signing. Web Desk

According to a handout released by the ECP, the commission has requested Punjab Governor Balighur Rehman to schedule a meeting on Feb 14 (Tuesday) to discuss the date for provincial

The handout said that Chief Election Commissioner Sikandar Sultan Raja presided over a meet-ing today — that included ECP Secretary Umer Hameed and other



senior officials and members — to discuss the "implementation" of the LHC order.The commission said it had written a letter to Rehman to suggest "an appropriate time" for tomorrow's meet-ing.It added that the electoral body had appointed the ECP sec-retary to head the discussions with the governor, along with ECP

Special Secretary Zafar Iqbal Hussain and Director General (Law) Mohammad Arshad. The designated ECP team would then brief the commission about the talks so that it could decide on the future strategy for conducting polls in the province.The Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa assem-blies — where the PTI had governments — were dissolved on January 14 and January 18, respectively, in an attempt to pave the way for snap polls. On Jan 24, the ECP wrote letters to the principal secretaries of Punjab and KP governors, suggesting elections in Punjab between April 9 and 13, and in KP between April 15 and 17.Web Desk

# Search for survivors slows as Turkiye-Syria quake toll passes 35,000

Rescue teams began to wind down the search for survivors on Monday, a week after an earthquake devastated parts of Turkiye and Syria leaving more than 35,000 dead and millions in dire need of aid

While the focus switched to helping desperate survivors who lack food and shelter, stories continue to emerge of people found alive in the rubble seven days after the 7.8-magnitude tremor.

On Monday, a 12-year-old boy named Kaan was pulled from the debris in southern Hatay, 182 hours after the fifth-deadliest earthquake of the 21st century. Turkish radio reported.

However, experts warn hopes of finding people alive are dimming. The confirmed death toll stands at 35,224 as officials and medics said 31,643 people had died in Turkiye and at least 3,581 in Syria. The United Nations said it expects the toll to rise far higher. The United Nations has decried the failure to ship desperately needed aid to war-torn regions of Syria and warned that the toll is set to rise even higher as expects caution that hopes for finding people alive dim with each higher as experts caution that hopes for finding people alive dim with each

Politicians, intelligentsia and members of the legal fraternity almost discussed all issues relating to the country and Balochistan at the first Reimagining Pakistan seminar. The speakers delivered storny and speeches based on facts and figures with regard to the prevailing economic crisis and political uncertainty at the seminar organized by the Balochistan Peace Forum (BPF) run by Senior politician Nawabzada Lashkari Raisani.

Political pundits called it a gathering of political dissidents since most of the political figures have been sidelined by their own political parties.

Nevertheless, Shahid Khaqan Abbasi, the former prime minister defended the Pakistan Muslim League (N) supremo Nawaz Sharif and urged the judiciary to undo its wrongs to the former premier.

The session was underway for 7 hours

Throughout the seven hours long sessions, Mr. Abbasi faced the brunt of stormy and aggressive speakers criticizing Islamabad for what they called stepmotherly treatment. Hussain Wadela, the patron-in-chief of Gwadar Haq Do Tehrik put very hard questions before the audience and called for addressing the grievances of the people of the country's port city.

Miftah Ismail presented killings facts about the declining economic con-

dition of the country and the socio-economic state of the people. Former Chief Minister Nawab Muhammad Aslam Raisani reiterated the demand for immediate recovery of the missing persons and termed it one of the most important issues, Balochistan is facing today.

Mehfooz Ali Khan shared killing facts

Former Secretary of Finance Balochistan, Mehfooz Ali Khan shared killing facts about Islamabad's stepmotherly treatment towards Balochistan. He mentioned that gas was discovered in Sui in 1952 and Dera Bugti was provided a gas facility in 2015.

Young intellectual, Rafiullah Kakar termed the undeclared MPA fund as a major speed breaker and political bribe before the political parties. He spoke at length about the issues of bad governance, the province is facing today.

## Time for decisive action

Never before in recent decades has Pakistan been in such a state of crisis. Our economy, politics and society are in disar-

About the economy, the question being asked is 'will we soon default?' The combination of external debt, imports, and forex exchange reserves leave many wondering. Understandably, the focus at present is on survival

But even when policy-makers take a longer view of the economy, soundbites about GDP growth and IMF pro-grammes replace vision and strategy. There is no deeper inquiry about what is best for the country. Whether GDP growth results from increase in manufactured goods or from one-time spending of borrowing does not figure in our discussion.

Nor do we discuss how to use the IMF programme to strengthen the country's economic fun-damentals and avoid future crises. Both agriculture and manufacturing are in decline, consequently plunging exports. Slow accumulation of capital and slow produc-tivity growth have reduced the economy's

potential for growth.

For years, the apparent object of our economic policy has been to survive the current economic cri-sis by piling debt on debt,

until the next one comes along. We continued to take on more debt from wherever it came, includ-ing at very high rates from the bond market. No one gave any thought to how it would be repaid. Since 2008, Pakistan's total stock of debt and lia-bilities has grown by \$85 billion. We have paid about \$114 billion since 2008, yet the debt stock 2008, yet the debt stock has still grown by \$85 billion. A more flawed economic policy is hard

to find.

Until a few years ago, the debate in Pakistan about economic growth centred on whether we are a security or a devel-opment state. That line of thought suggested that we may be spending too much on defence at the expense of the economy. The debate is redundant now. So much of government spending goes to paying interest on loans that all expenses, including defence, have taken a back seat. In fiscal 22, the federal government spent almost 85 per cent of its net receipts on interest. Most other expenses are met from borrowing.

Our troubles are not for want of capital. They result from unimaginative policies. Post 9/11, the country was awash in for-eign exchange. By 2008, we had spent it all and were back with the IMF with a sudden 40 per cent devaluation. There was

nothing to show for the

money spent. Much of the debt went into meeting imports and debt servicing needs. Two-thirds of our external debt has been spent on the budget and BoP, and only one-third on development. Apart from CPEC investment, the debt amount was not invested. Even the CPEC projects selected by Pakistan have not so far increased our ability to repay. There was no

'game changer'.
Economic partners no longer take us at our word. In over a year, end-less discussions with the have borne little fruit. All commitments to the IMF are now 'prior action' because we have lost their trust. Even traditional partners, China and Saudi Arabia, are reluctant to help. They know that this patient is

addicted to life support.

The key question that needs to be asked by economic planners is where we want the economy to go from here. What kind of an economy Pakistan aims to have in five, ten or even fifty years. Specious talk about wanting to be a knowledge economy or a producer of high-tech goods does not cut it if we do not put in the needed hard work and investment into these

ideas.
Political capacity too is fragile. With elections in

And it will further increase our debt. What happens next?

# The man behind our sedition law

"Power precedes liber-ty - ...liberty, from the very nature of things, is dependent upon power..." Thus wrote the English lawyer, judge, writer and philosopher, James Fitzjames Stephen in his book 'Liberty,

Equality, Fraternity (1873).
Stephen, a defender of old English liberalism, was a proponent of the concept of 'Ordered Liberty'. He was first a Liberty'. He was first a friend but later a critic of John Stuart Mill and his treatise 'On Liberty' (1859), a major source today for free speech advocacy. Stephen's own lesser-known book, in which he criticised Mill was said to be partly inspired by his experiences in India. Between 1869 and 1872 he was a legal member of the Viceroy's Executive Viceroy's Executive Council in India and on the Indian Law Commission. He had a Pakistani law. Aside from his grim

view of human nature and disdain for Mill's concep-tion of individual liberty, Stephen believed in the inequality of men and women and believed that women, being the weaker sex, would not be able to enjoy the protection of if men and women were placed on the same legal and educational footing. His discriminatory views extended to political inequality as he was also perturbed by the expanding democracy in England at the time. In 1867 the English elec-torate doubled, and all adults had the right to vote. He believed universal suffrage would achieve nothing because political power would not change its nature. The person commanding the greatest number would still rule. Strength in whatever form would still determine ultimate politi-

cal power.
In 1867, Stephen was given the high-profile task to prosecute the governor of Jamaica, Edward Eyre, for wrongly ordering the court martial and execution of a Jamaican political rival and critic for involvement in the Morant Bay Rebellion of 1865. Oddly during the court hearing. Stephen was observed praising Eyre as a courageous man who had acted honourably in an emergency to suppress a rebellion. contribute to the failure of the prosecution and his sympathies towards a racist authori-

In 1869, Stephen went to India and drafted the Indian Evidence Act and reworked the draft of the Indian Contract Act, both inherited by Pakistan and effective to this day. His most interesting, but unsurprising, contribution is the amendment of the Indian Penal Code in 1870 which introduced Section 124A, the law of

sedition. In short, Section 124A prohibits words or other conduct which causes hatred or con-tempt, or excites disaffec-tion (disloyalty or feelings of enmity) towards the government. Pakistan inherited the

Indian Penal Code when it gained its independ-ence. It was considered a masterpiece drafted pri-marily by the notable English jurist Thomas Babington Macaulay. The first draft of the penal code was completed in 1837 but was enacted in 1860 due to delays. The urgency to enact then was largely prompted by the 1857 Indian War of Independence or the Indian Mutiny as the British called it. The Penal Code was designed to make imperial authori-ty more effective and legitimate, and there was no better time than after the rebellion. Macaulay had

tion at the time of enact-ment of the Penal Code in 1860 - perhaps due to his libertarian sensibilities regarding regarding oppressive state powers. He had also followed the lead of the US constitution and limited the offence of treason to levying war (against the state) only, as opposed to English criminal law where treason offences were expansive and included planning the sovereign's death and assisting enemies at war. In 1870, Stephen inserted all of the missing offences regarding trea-son and sedition by amendment (sections 121A, 124A, and 125 of the Penal Code). He showed surprise regard-ing the omissions by Macaulay and considered such offences to be "required in the circum-stances". According to Stephen, the law of sedition was necessary to pro-tect the British colonial

government in India from dissent and rebellion.

In his book 'A History of the Criminal Law of England' (1883), Stephen strongly advocated for laws against sedition. He was clear that freedom of speech should be limited to protect against the spread of dangerous ideas that could incite violence or overthrow of the gov-ernment. Stephen consid-ered sedition to be an offence against internal public tranquility but not necessarily accompanied or reading to open vio

So why is it that the government could not be expected to tolerate words causing mere hatred, contempt, or dis-affection short of incite-ment to violence? The simple reason is that sedition was seen as a prelim-inary step that could (but not necessarily would) lead to an actual rebel-lion. Seditious words were sufficient for the government to be offend-ed, even in the absence of a risk of a rebellion, and

While these are clear acts of unethical behaviour, there are other examples of violation of laws and even the American constitution that have been allowed to slide. In 2016, then leader of the Republican majority in the Senate Mitch McConnell decided he would not allow then pres-ident Obama to fill a seat in the US Supreme Court that had become vacant. When Obama nominated a candidate to fill the seat, as stip-ulated by the Constitution, the Senate leader simply ignored it, leaving the Supreme Court one seat short for almost a year. Leader McConnell cited his constitutional right to not give the presidential nominee a hearing. Article II, Section 2 of

the US constitution states that the president shall appoint justices to the Supreme Court "with advice and consent of the Senate." Whether such "advice and consent" could include the right to simply refuse to consider a duly nominated justice is for legal scholars to argue

Last but not least, the former president tried to overturn the results of the 2020 election by coming up with a twisted theory of election fraud. He wrongly asserted the vice president had powers to refuse to certify the results. Even his instigation of a riot that resulted in several deaths and the sacking of Capitol Hill in January 2021 has so far not resulted in any consequences for him.

# **Growing discontent**

Interacting with people has always been one of the main components of the art of ruling. In India, the panchayat system in villages ensures that people from the ruling class regularly interact with the ruled. In modern democracies like the UK, local parliamentarians invest their energies in schemes that appease their voters. They also prefer to meet their constituents by reg-ularly visiting their con-stituencies and sparing some time for those who vote them into power.

In the past, Greek city states, including Athens, used to have a mecha-nism that could help them learn about people's sen-timents. Even Sparta, which was dictatorial in nature, had crafted some principles that would enable them to have firsthand knowledge of peo-

ple's feelings. In Pakistan, there has been a lack of interaction between the ruling elite and the people. Many parliamentarians prefer to stay in federal and provincial capitals, provincial capitals, enjoying luxuries of life in elite housing societies and upscale neighbour-hoods. It is true that they show up at the funerals of some local notables in their constituencies, but mostly they remain away from their native towns and only bother to meet their voters at the time of

elections. These politicians do not have proper offices in constituencies to meet their voters and learn about their prob-lems. After becoming public representatives, they completely ignore their voters who come in droves to cast their votes and help them win. Our prime ministers, who should be in the

upper and lower houses of parliament to answer the questions of public representatives, find excuses to avoid these sessions. It is true that some former prime ministers did attend the ses-sions, but it is also a bitter truth that most of them frequently offer excuses to remain absent from such gatherings.

For instance, former prime minister Nawaz Sharif was criticized by a number of critics for giving less time to parlia-ment during 2013 and 2017. He reportedly attended 63 days during his tenure after which he disqualified Nawaz's nephew Hamza Sharif attended only 31 sessions. His younger brother Shehbaz Sharif was criticized for skip-ping various sessions of the Punjab Assembly despite being the leader of the house.

During the same term,

the political rival of the Sharifs, Imran Khan, also had the lowest attendance in parliament. During the 2013-2018 term, he attended only 20 National

Assembly sessions out of the total of 465. Not only do prime min-isters and chief ministers love to ignore parliamen-tary sessions, but federal and provincial ministers also follow in the foot-steps of their political

mentors when it comes to attending legislative ses-sions. Many ministers and advisers spend their time in different countries, attending various conferences or accompanying the prime minister as a member of the dele-

parliamentary

often witness the anger of various committee mem-bers over the absence of ministers and advisers. It seems that members of our ruling elite are not only indifferent to the problems of their con-stituents, but are also accustomed to skipping the meetings held to discuss such problems. This indifference prompts them to come up with anti-people policies. Their development schemes and social proj-ects indicate that they cater to the needs of the select few. They seem to have less awareness about the issues being faced by the people. For instance, since

1988, the country may have witnessed hundreds of development and infrastructure projects, and most of these projects were designed in a way that led to the demolition of numerous slums and low-income areas.

From the Lyari Expressway and Gujjar Nullah affectees and farmers around Ravi in Lahore to victims of the Mirani dam in Balochistan, millions of people have either been displaced or their liveli-hoods destroyed because of these projects. Due to anti-encroachment drives, thousands of peo-ple lose their sources of employment every year. It is amusing that authorities never pay attention to elite schools or expensive hotels or thousands of private-property owners who encroach upon costly public land. The ruling elite still plans to launch such schemes that will largely affect the poor residents of various local-ities. We are yet to see if those who have encroached railways land will be evicted or not when the railway upgrade projects are carried out in the next few years. But why do sections of

our ruling elite demon-strate such nonchalance towards ordinary people' The answer lies in lack of interaction between the rulers and the ruled. There was a time when sections of the elite would send their siblings to low-cost schools, public universities and ernment colleges where rich people would get an opportunity to interact with students from differ-ent financial backent grounds. But with the rise of gated communities and ultra-modern housing societies, such interaction

has come to an end. Elite and posh neighbourhoods have their own schools and higher education institutions which are affiliated with foreign education institutions. Small markets and ven-dors outside these areas used to be one of the ways connecting the rich of the country to veg-etable sellers or shopkeepers. With the rise of shopping malls, such

interaction is also over. Most factory owners in the past would visit their manufacturing plants, interacting with their employees. Now with the rise of modern technology, the owners can monicCTV or any mobile application. The fall of trade unions, which used to protest against harsh working conditions or non-acceptance of their demands, has also reduced the need for cap-italists to show up at factories and talk to workers Most politicians from

the bottom layer of social stratification made it to parliament through student and trade union poli-tics. Jehangir Badar, Iqbal Haider, Taj Haider, Mairaj Muhammad Khan and others were involved in either trade unions or student politics. Our rul-ing elite has weakened trade unions and banned

student organizations deliberately. Consequently, it has become almost impossible for a low-income per-son to participate in politics, and entering the Pakistani parliament has now become just a dream for ordinary people. It is no wonder then that an overwhelming majority of our lawmakers in provincial assemblies and parliament are million-aires and billionaires. And these people serve

the same class.

If our politicians want to consolidate democratic traditions, they need to reconnect with the people and interact with them.

In a detailed examination of the food and agriculture industry. Oxfam found that billionaires in that industry saw their wealth increase by \$382 billion during the pandemic. An emergency windfall tax on their wealth increase alone (to say nothing of their pre-pandemic billions) could end world hunger and double the incomes of 545 million small-scale farm-

In January, an analysis by the Fight Inequality Alliance, Institute for Policy Studies, Oxfam, and the Patriotic Millionaires found that an annual wealth tax starting at just 2 percent for those

with more than \$5 million, 3 percent for those with over \$50 million, and up to 5 percent for billion-aires could generate upwards of \$2.52 trillion a year. That's enough to life year. That's enough to lift 2.3 billion people out of poverty, fund vaccines for everyone in the world, and deliver universal health-care and social protections for all the citizens of lowand lower-middle-income countries.

A group of over 150 millionaires released a strong statement calling on Davos attendees to face the dangers of runaway wealth inequality and speak out in favor of national efforts to levy progressive income and wealth taxes on the ultra-wealthy. ### Flour millers observe strike in Punjab

### Two suspected robbers arrested after police encounter

KARACHI: Two suspected robbers were arrested in injured condition by police following an alleged encounter near Karachi's Bahadurabad area on Monday.

According to details, the police arrested two robbers in injured condition after an exchange of fire near Bahadurabad area of Karachi.

In a statement, the police said a patrolling team signalled sus-pected robbers – who were trav-elling on a motorcycle – to stop. Police gave them a chase while returning the fire. In the end, they arrested two suspected muggers in injured condition.

"The ophiolitic belt at the Pak-Afghan border in Waziristan district, covering an area of about 1127 sq. km, is rich in copper and many other precious miner-als. The rock sequence in this belt mostly consists of sea bed environment including ultrabasic rocks; basaltic pillow lava; andesite, gabbro sheeted dykes; dacite along with their equivalents; i.e., diorite, gran-odiorite, etc. The sequence of sedimentary formations in this area is characterised according to the presence of pelagic sediments, i.e., limestone, jasperite, etc. Copper mineralisation in this area is strongly indicated by an on-the-ground associated stockwork of scattered gossans," he said.

During the same period, about 36 previously drilled samples taken from Shinkai were reanalysed and the ratio of gold contents between 0.2-1.57 gft was confirmed. At this stage, all the official activities got a sudden stop." INP **OGRA** notifies decline in LNG prices

ISLAMABAD: The Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (OGRA) on Monday has notified a reduction in Monday has notified a reduction in prices of liquefied natural gas (LNG) for consumers of two public gas utilities—Sui Northern Gas Pipelines Limited (SNGPL) and Sui Southern Gas Company (SSGC)—for February 2023.

According to details, the LNG price for SNGPL consumers has been reduced by \$0.61/mmbtu for February while for SSGC consumers the rate has been slashed by \$0.56/mmbtu.

After the reduction, the OGRA has

After the reduction, the OGRA has fixed the LNG price at \$13.70/mmbtu for SNGPL consumers and \$14.31/mmbtu for SSGC consumers.

In January, the LNG price was \$13.95/mmbtu for the SNGPL consumers.

sumers and \$14.51/mmbtu for the SSGC consumers Earlier in January, OGRA approved a 74 per cent increase in the

prescribed prices of natural gas for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

According to details, the regulator allowed Sui Northern Gas Pipeline Limited (SNGPL) to increase prices by up to 74.42 percent. It also allowed Sui Southern Gas Company (SSGC) to increase gas prices by 67.75 percent for the year 2022-23.

The oil and gas regulator approved increases of Rs406.28 and Rs469.28 per million British thermal units (mmBtu) for SNGPL and SSGC, respectively.

OGRA further said that the average gas price for SNGPL would reach Rs952.17 per unit from the existing rate of Rs545.89 per mmBtu, while that of SSGCL would reach Rs1,161 per unit from the current Rs692.63 per mmBtu.

Any revision as advised by the federal government shall be accordingly notified by OGRA INP
