Green bus service to be formally launched on July 17: CM Balochistan

QUETTA: The Balochistan government has decided to launch the much-awaited green bus service in the city on July 17 (next Monday). Chief Secretary Balochistan, Abdul Aziz Uqaili took to the social media network Twitter and announced the formal launching of the bus service in this provincial capital.

Test operations are to begin on July 13. Full-scale operations will be inaugurated on Monday, July 17 inshaAllah. Quetta's long-awaited quality public transport is finally here, the Chief Secretary Balochistan concluded. Dr. Faisal Ahmed Khan, the Chief of the Balochistan Public-Private Partnership Project has been instrumental in the implementation of the project.

4 buses each operate till Belili and Sariab from the city



Initially, the Balochistan Public-Private Partnership (BPPP), a well-placed source in the provincial government told Daily Quetta Voice. He said all stakeholders have been taken on board with regard to the launching of the much-awaited green bus project in

the provincial capital. However, he explained after thorough deliberations, the government decided to purchase 8

buses to facilitate the masses. As per the pilot project, four buses would operate from Serena Chowk Quetta to Belili and Four buses would operate till Sariab Customs, the officer mentioned.

The project was approved during Jam Kamal Khan government

The project of the green bus service was approved by the former chief minister Jam Kamal Khan-led government in Balochistan. The launching of the project was aimed at providing decent transportation to the citizens of Quetta. However, the green bus service could not be timely launched because of bureaucratic obstacles and a lack of political commitment.

48% women illiterate in Pakistan: Population Council

ISLAMABAD: July 11th commemorates World Population Day, an occasion that draws attention to the urgency and significance of population-related matters. This year's theme, "Unlocking the Power of Gender Equality: Uplifting the Voices of Women and Girls to Unlock Our World's Infinite Possibilities," strikes a profound chord in the context of Pakistan where women empowerment has remained a significant challenge due to low literacy rates and limited female participation in the workforce. Shockingly, 48% of women in Pakistan are illiterate, 79% are not part of the labor force, and only 10% can make independent decisions about their own health. This was discussed during the Media Coalition Meeting held to mark World Population Day organized by the Population Council. Media Coalition comprises of media persons from all provinces representing



all major media outlets of Pakistan. The coalition highlights the cross-sectoral impact of rapid population growth periodically to raise awareness and hold governments accountable for improving the well-being of the people. Briefing the media, Umme Kalsoom, Senior Project Officer at the Population Council presented the data on women's education, health and labour force participation. She stressed the media to raise awareness of these issues through their news stories. She said, "Media should highlight the issues to remove all forms of discrimination against girls, in terms of diet, education and healthcare. Girls should be treated as equal to boys and must be educated to plan their families according to their resources". She also urged the media to play its part in ensuring enrollment of all out-of-school girls and incentivization of their education till the secondary level, as 37% of girls remain out of school in the country. Media can also hold govern-

ments responsible to ensure service delivery of family planning services besides raising awareness to enhance male engagement in family planning. Participants of the meeting pledged to use media as an effective tool in the promotion of women's empowerment to ensure girls can exercise their rights and have choices to be able to balance their families' resources and family size in order to reach their full potential. They also agreed to play a positive role in increasing access to reproductive health information and services to married couples in Pakistan as media campaigns could impress upon the governments to ensure the availability of contraceptives and trained staff at all health outlets. Media Coalition Members pledged to highlight the need for legislation on pre-marital counseling, family planning, the enhanced role of men in girls education, women's empowerment, and discouraging child marriage.

Erdogan links Sweden's Nato bid with Turkey's EU membership

Nato's efforts to present a united front at a summit focused on helping Ukraine defeat Russia and Kyiv's push to join the alliance were undermined on Monday by a shock Turkish ultimatum on Sweden's membership bid.

As Ukraine's forces claimed more successes against Russian positions, Nato's 31 members agreed to simplify Kyiv's eventual accession bid by dropping a requirement that it completes a formal road map of reforms.

Alliance leaders gathering in Vilnius on the eve of Tuesday's summit were hoping a meeting between Erdogan and Sweden's Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson would see the Turkish leader lift his veto on Sweden's membership.

But President Recep Tayyip Erdogan appeared in no mood to compromise, declaring that he would only back Sweden's Nato candidacy if European Union members — most of whom are also Nato allies — agree to revive Turkey's negotiations to join the EU.



World War II. "Almost all the Nato members are EU members. I now am addressing these countries, which are making Turkey wait for more than 50 years," Erdogan said, before boarding his flight for the Lithuanian capital.

"First, open the way to Turkey's membership of the European Union, and then we will open it for Sweden, just as we had opened it for Finland," the Chancellor Olaf Scholz, a powerful figure in both Nato and the EU, was quick to stress there was no link between Sweden's bid and Turkey's EU application, which was formally launched in 2009 but has stalled. "The other question is one that is not connected with it and that is why I do not think it should be seen as a connected issue."

Nato Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg also expressed caution, recalling that at previous Nato talks in Madrid, Turkey had agreed to a set of conditions for Swedish membership that made no mention of EU membership. Web Desk

Police reached the spot and started an investigation into the incident. The motive behind the attack could not be ascertained immediately.

Pakistan aims for transformative \$30-50b investment boost in agri sector

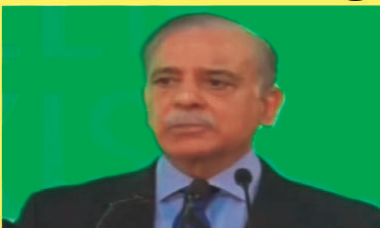
Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Monday said that the government expected investment worth billions of dollars in the next four to five years in the agriculture sector in Pakistan.

He expressed these remarks during a seminar on agriculture and food security held in Islamabad. Chief of Army Staff (COAS) General Syed Asim Munir attended the seminar as the guest of honour.

The premier highlighted the importance of agriculture for the economy of Pakistan and the landmark steps being undertaken by the government to exploit its full potential in agriculture and other domains under the ambit of the recently launched Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC).

The envoys of many Gulf countries expressed their interest in investing in Pakistan, Shehbaz

PM Shehbaz said that Green Pakistan Initiative would be the second green revolution, paving the way for prosperity and progress in the coun-



ty. "He stated that under this programme, the government anticipated an average investment of 30 to 50 billion dollars in Pakistan over the next three to four years. "Our efforts are focused on enhancing productivity and transform barren land into fertile ground which will significantly boost our resources."

"Pakistan cannot take further loans. I, COAS or the finance minister cannot reveal how we managed to acquire loan to try and avert a default. Thankfully, due to our teamwork, SLA happened and after two days, IMF's board meeting is also scheduled. But this is not enough and it is just the beginning of a long journey of untiring efforts and we need a vision for it," he added.

He lamented that many research centres had been established in Pakistan but many of them became unproductive after 1960s. "The premier said that state-owned enterprises (SOEs) were bleeding Rs500 billion from Pakistan's scarce resources. "We have all the resources and all seasons... still we have been unable to become a prosperous country," he regretted. "We are importing \$4.5 billion worth of palm oil. We're a developing country we cannot spend such a huge amount on palm oil," he added Web Desk

Delayed completion of LBs polls in Balochistan

After a long period of 14 months, the final phase of local bodies elections was completed in 35 districts of Balochistan the other day. The local bodies' elections were held in May last year in all districts of Balochistan except Quetta, Hub and Lasbela. So far, no election schedule has been announced for Quetta, Hub and Lasbela districts of Balochistan.

On July 6 this month, the chairman and deputy chairman of all 35 districts were elected in a peaceful and democratic manner. The government deserves to be appreciated for holding historic local bodies elections regularly last year and then subsequently completing the second, third, and fourth final phase of polls.

14 months already passed
Nevertheless, it is very strange that it took the government and the election commission of Pakistan to complete the final phase after 14 months. The constitutional tenure of the local bodies elections in Balochistan is four years like in other parts of the country.

As months already passed, and it will take another week for the newly elected chairman and deputy chairman to formally take charge of their offices. Then, the newly elected LBs district heads are likely to commence the battle for their constitutional administrative, and financial powers entrusted to them as per Article 140-A of the Constitution.

Successful provincial governments have always been reluctant to devolve powers to LGs
It is ironic fact that successive provincial governments have always been reluctant to decentralize powers to the local government as per the Constitution. Although, the same chairman and deputy chairman of districts and councilors belong to political parties.

LGs play a key role in the development and prosperity of the country and the development of the provinces, towns and cities. The mandate of elected gross roots level. Moreover, this is a bitter reality that the members of the provincial assembly (MPAs) have always been reluctant to devolve powers to their own chairman and councilors.

Assemblies jettison legislative councilors should construct trusts
This is one of the underlying reasons behind bad governance and lack of access to policymakers. This is another bitter reality that military dictators have always empowered councilors, unlike successive fragile democratic governments.

To be precise, the Balochistan government needs to devolve powers to the councilors and chairman of districts, municipal committees, and corporations without any delay.

Never before in recent decades has Pakistan been in such a state of crisis. Our economy, politics and society are in disarray.

About the economy, the question being asked is 'will we soon default on our external debt?' The combination of external debt, imports, and foreign exchange reserves leave much wondering. Understandably, the focus at present is on survival.

But even when policymakers take a longer view, the more economic soundbites about GDP growth and IMF programmes replace vision and strategy. The current deeper inquiry about what is best for the country is being lost.

Whether GDP growth results from increase in manufactured goods or from one-time spending of borrowing does not figure in our discussion. Nor do we discuss how to use the IMF to strengthen the country's economic fundamentals, and a future strategy for agriculture and manufacturing in decline, consequently reducing the country's Slow accumulation of capital and slow productivity growth.

For years, the apparent hope of our economic policy has been to survive the current economic crisis by piling debt on debt,

until the next one comes along. We continue to take on more debt from wherever it came, including money from the bond market. No one gave any thought to how it would be repaid.

Since 2008, Pakistan's total stock of debt and liabilities has grown by \$85 billion. In 2022, the total debt stood at \$114 billion since 2008, yet the debt stock has still grown by \$85 billion. More economic policy is hard to find.

Our troubles are not for want of capital. They are for want of sound economic policies. Until the country was awash in foreign exchange. By 2008, the country had lost it all and were back with the IMF with a sudden 40 per cent devaluation. There was

nothing to show for the money spent. Much of the debt went into meeting imports and only one-third of the external debt has been spent on the budget and BoP.
