



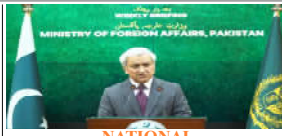

Balochistan: Curfew Imposed in Khadkocha, Mastung

MASTUNG: The Balochistan government has imposed a curfew in Khadkocha, a sub-division of Mastung district, effective from 9:00 PM on Wednesday, July 22, 2026, until further notice to maintain law

and order. During the curfew, citizens have been strictly directed to remain inside their homes and avoid unnecessary movement. Residents have also been urged to fully cooperate with the administration and security authorities.

Officials warned that strict legal action will be taken against anyone violating the curfew order.

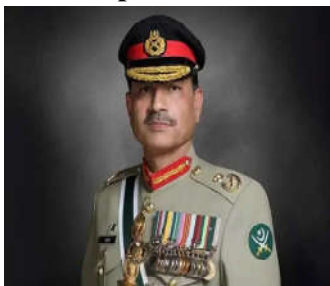

RAWALPINDI: Chief of Army Staff and Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir has said that lasting peace in Balochistan can be achieved through collective efforts by the security forces, law enforcement agencies and the people of the province.

nally sponsored elements were attempting to disrupt peace and stability in Balochistan.

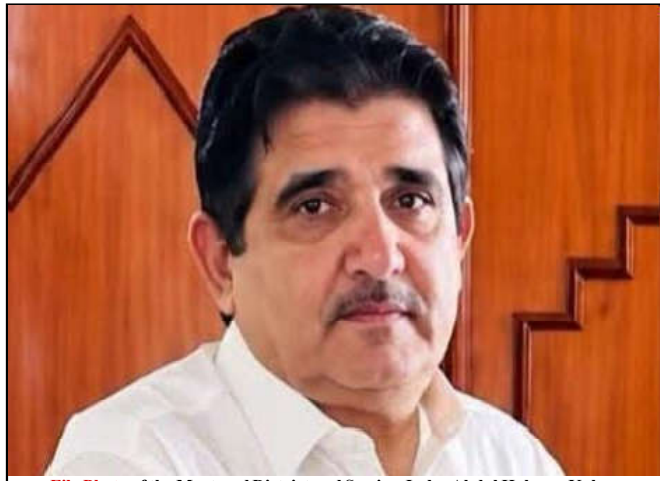
The armed forces, with the support of the people, would foil all nefarious designs of the country's enemies, he added.

Session Judge Abdul Hakeem Kakar Martyred in Mastung Terror Attack, CM Balochistan Vows Decisive Action

Session Judge Abdul Hakeem Kakar and his security guard were martyred after unidentified terrorists ambushed their official vehicle near the Wali Khan Railway Crossing on the Mastung Bypass on Wednesday, while Additional Sessions Judge Tariq Lashari sustained critical injuries, according to police and official sources.

The judges were travelling from Quetta to the Sessions Court in Mastung when their vehicle came under heavy gun-

fire near the railway crossing. Security forces and police immediately reached the scene, secured the area, and launched a search operation to track down the attackers.

The injured Additional Sessions Judge was shifted to a hospital for emergency treatment, while law enforcement agencies began collecting evidence as part of the investigation.

Strongly condemning the Mastung terrorist attack, Balochistan Chief Minister Mir Sarfraz Bugti described the assault on Session Judge Abdul

Hakeem Kakar as "an attack on the state." He vowed that the terrorists involved would be pursued and brought to justice without exception.

"The blood of our judges and law enforcement personnel will not be shed in vain," the chief minister said, adding that there would be no leniency for terrorists or their facilitators.

He reiterated that the government would crush those challenging the writ of the state and eliminate every terrorist network operating in Balochistan.

CM Bugti further pledged to intensify counterterrorism operations across the province, stating that Balochistan will not serve as a safe haven for terrorists.

He emphasized that those responsible for the deadly attack would be held accountable and that the fight against terrorism would continue with full force.

The Mastung attack on the judiciary has prompted heightened security measures in the area, while authorities continue investigations to identify and arrest the perpetrators.

South-West Asia and the War Against Narcotics: Where Does Pakistan Stand?

Lady Macbeth once remarked that "a little water clears us of this deed" after the assassination of the King. Yet, with time, she remained haunted, obsessively rubbing her hands in an attempt to cleanse the imagined stains of blood. The persistence of narcotics production and trade in South-West Asia resembles this unending struggle—a dark reality that cannot be easily washed away.

Afghanistan has long been recognized as the world's largest producer of opium, with its roots tracing back to the early 1900s. Over the decades, the repercussions of this industry spilled into neighboring Pakistan and Iran.

In the late 2000s, Taliban leader Mullah Omar imposed a strict ban on poppy cultivation through threats, forced eradication, and severe punishments. However, as revealed by the UNODC Opium Survey 2007, the ban primarily targeted cultivation while the trade continued. After the fall of the Taliban, opium again became a major source of funding for logistics, weapons, and militia payments.

In 2022, the Taliban leadership once again announced a ban on poppy cultivation, with Hibatullah Akhundzada officially declaring significant



reductions. Some Western reports, supported by satellite imagery, showcased declining poppy fields in southern Afghanistan. However, this raises critical questions: Can Afghanistan realistically abandon such a central economic resource while facing sanctions? And what

consequences does this shift have for Pakistan? While certain international outlets hastily claim that Pakistan has become a new hub for narcotics, such narratives ignore key realities.

The issue is not a simple matter of "shifting sands" but a complex regional security

challenge.

The porous border between Pakistan and Afghanistan, coupled with cross-border networks of drug traffickers, means temporary shifts in cultivation are often strategic rather than permanent. Moreover, Afghanistan's pivot towards methamphet-

amine production—highlighted by satellite evidence of expanded ephedra processing hubs—reflects adaptive strategies of traffickers rather than genuine eradication.

In Pakistan, however, the situation is markedly different. Since 2001, the country has largely main-

tained its "poppy-free" status, despite sporadic spillovers from Afghanistan.

Following the Taliban's 2022 ban, some illicit cultivations did emerge in border areas.

In Pakistan, particularly within Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Yet, these were swiftly

addressed through Pakistan's Poppy Elimination Campaign (PEC-2025).

This multi-agency effort, led by the Anti-Narcotics Force (ANF) and provincial administrations, successfully destroyed thousands of acres of illegal poppy fields. Over 250 FIRs were

registered, dozens of arrests were made, and awareness campaigns were launched across educational institutions.

Importantly, independent surveys after March 2025 confirmed the effectiveness of these eradication drives.

Pakistan's determination to combat narcotics often remains under-reported internationally, overshadowed by outdated or selective portrayals.

The fact remains: Pakistan continues to fight this menace not only for its own stability but also for global security.

What is urgently needed is greater recognition of these efforts by the international community and enhanced cooperation from agencies such as the UNODC.

As South-West Asia remains at the heart of global narcotics trade routes, Pakistan's role is both frontline and decisive. Balochistan, in particular, holds the potential to transform from a vulnerable transit zone into a hub of opportunity, stability, and resilience. Just as Lady Macbeth's imagined guilt could not be washed away with water, the global community cannot absolve itself of responsibility by ignoring Pakistan's sacrifices and achievements in this ongoing struggle.

Forced Marriage in Islam: A Clear Violation of Women's Rights and Human Dignity

Forced marriage remains one of the most damaging cultural practices in parts of the Muslim world today. Despite being justified in the name of honor, tradition, or family unity, Islam itself strictly forbids forcing any woman, or man, into a marriage they do not want. Islamic teachings make consent the

core of marriage, while coercion makes a marriage batil (invalid).

The Qur'an Clearly Forbids Forced Marriages. Allah states in Surah An-Nisa:

"O you who believe, it is not lawful for you to inherit women against their will." (Qur'an 4:19)

This verse was revealed to abolish the jahiliyyah practice of controlling or forcing women into marriages.

Islam replaced oppression with dignity, choice, and responsibility.

Prophetic Example: Forced Marriages Declared Invalid. A woman once came to the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH)



complaining that her father had married her without her permission. The Prophet (PBUH) gave her the full right to reject or accept the marriage, proving that consent is mandatory.

Hadith References: Sahih al-Bukhari, Hadith 5138.

Sahih Muslim, Hadith 1419. These narrations all confirm that the Prophet (PBUH) allowed the woman to annul her forced marriage.

One narration even states that she chose to remain married but wanted to teach women that fa-

thers have no right to force their daughters. Parents Can Advise, But They Cannot Force.

Islam highly respects parents, but marriage choice is not their right. They can guide, suggest, and advise, but they have ab-

solutely no power to force their child into marrying someone. Even if parents think they "know what is best," they cannot override the choice of their daughter or son. The final decision always belongs to the person getting married.

Statements such as: "If you don't marry this one, who will marry you?" "You have no choice." "Do it for family honor." "You must obey your parents."

These are pure emotional manipulation, and Islam does

not allow it. Emotional or Psychological Pressure is Also Haram. Forced marriage is not only when someone is physically pressured. Even emotional, mental, or family pressure counts as force. Any Nikkah done under fear, pressure, or

threats is invalid (Batil) in Islam. This ruling is based on multiple hadith in which the Prophet (PBUH) annulled marriages done without consent.

Modern Forced Marriages, A New Way of Burying Women Alive. Before Islam, Arabs used to bury baby girls alive. Today, many scholars say: "We no longer bury women in the ground, we bury their dreams on the day of their Nikkah."

When a girl is forced into a marriage, pressured emotionally, or told she has no other choice, we destroy her life while she is still alive. This is the new form of burying women alive, and Islam came to end this injustice completely.

Forced marriage has no place in Islam. It is against the Qur'an, against the Sunnah, and against the dignity that Islam gives to every woman and man. Parents must love, support, and guide, but never control or force marriage decisions. "Allah gave women this right, and no one can take it away."

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Balochistan Orders Halt to Unauthorized Drain Construction by Sindh Irrigation in Nasirabad Division

NASIRABAD: Commissioner Salauddin Norzai chaired a high-level meeting to discuss the construction of a drainage channel allegedly being carried out by the Sindh Irrigation Department within Balochistan's territory without obtaining the required No Objection Certificate (NOC) from the Government of Balochistan.

The meeting was attended by Chief Engineer Canals Qurban Ali Jatoi, Superintendent Engineer Sindh Irrigation Circle/XEN Mudassar Zafar Khosa, Assistant Commissioner Sohbatpur Saifuddin Khosa, and Assistant Commissioner Jaffarabad Dhiraj Kalra.

During the briefing, Chief Engineer Canals Qurban Ali Jatoi informed participants that the drainage channel under construction



within Balochistan's jurisdiction was being executed by the Sindh Irrigation Department and could have direct implications for Balochistan's drainage system. Expressing serious concern, XEN Mudassar Zafar Khosa stated that the excavation and construction work had begun without securing the mandatory NOC from the Government of Balochistan. He stressed that no work

should be permitted within the province's boundaries until formal approval is obtained from the competent authorities.

Following the discussion, Commissioner Salauddin Norzai directed the Deputy Commissioner Sohbatpur to convene a district-level meeting on the matter and ordered that all construction activities on the disputed drainage channel within

Balochistan's limits be suspended until the issue is resolved through proper legal and administrative channels.

Officials from the Balochistan Irrigation Department also recalled that during the devastating 2010 floods, floodwaters entering through the Noor Wah channel caused extensive damage to the province's drainage infrastructure.

They cautioned that any future project likely

to adversely affect Balochistan's drainage network, agricultural land, public infrastructure, or local communities cannot be allowed without a comprehensive technical review and official approval.

The meeting underscored the provincial government's commitment to safeguarding Balochistan's water infrastructure and ensuring that all inter-provincial development projects comply with legal procedures and environmental considerations before implementation.
