Balochistan CM Sarfraz Bugti Warns Mastung Orchard Owners, Orders Tehsildar Recruitment Inquiry

Quetta: Balochistan Chief Minister Mir Sarfraz Bugti has warned owners of grape orchards and private properties in Mastung that they could be treated as facilitators if their land is used to launch attacks on security forces or government officials. He also announced an inquiry into complaints concerning the BPSC Tehsildar recruitment process.

Speaking at the Central Police Office in Quetta on Friday, Bugti said orchard owners had repeatedly been warned against allowing terrorists to use their properties for terrorist activities.

He said if a security forces' convoy or the provincial interior minister came under attack from an orchard, the property owner could not simply claim ignorance about the presence of terrorists.

"If private property is used for terrorism, its owner will also be considered a facilitator," Bugti warned.

He said the government did not want civilians to be harmed because terrorists often use local residents as human shields. However, he stressed that the state's patience had limits.

Bugti warned that if private properties continued to be used for terrorist attacks, the government could consider relocating residents or removing orchards being used for terrorism.

"The blood of Pakistan Army, FC and police personnel is sacred," he said, adding that the government would not tolerate the continued use of private properties for attacks on security personnel.

BPSC Tehsildar Recruitment Probe

Regarding the Balochistan Public Service Commission (BPSC) Tehsildar recruitment, Bugti said an internal error had come to his notice following complaints about the recruitment process.

He announced that a committee had been formed in coordination with BPSC to investigate the matter and submit its report within seven to 10 days.

The chief minister said the findings would be shared with the media and the public after the report was received.

Bugti reiterated that the provincial government would not compromise on merit, repeatedly emphasizing "merit, merit and merit."

He said political considerations would not be allowed to influence recruitment, even if maintaining merit resulted in political losses.

Balochistan Police Digitalisation

Bugti also launched 18 digital initiatives of Balochistan Police, including eight upgraded applications and eight newly developed ones.

He announced Rs50 million for further police digitalisation during the current year and a Rs5 million cash award for the officers and personnel who worked on the digital initiatives.

The new services include public complaints, criminal justice facilities, women's protection, travel and hotel services and the IG Police complaints portal.

Bugti said the women's safety app would enable users to issue an emergency alert with one click and immediately notify police and family members. On the overall security situation, he described Balochistan as facing an "intelligence-based war" and said the government would continue strengthening the police and modernising law-enforcement systems.

Pims fire: Mustafa Kamal says 'no one will be spared', calls for reforming health sector

Health Minister Mustafa Kamal on Friday vowed that "no one will be spared" while talking about the fire at the Pakistan Institute of Medical Sciences (Pims) that claimed the lives of 14 infants, adding that the country's health sector needed to be reformed.

Speaking in the Senate, Kamal said: "No one intends to spare or save anyone. I am saying this on behalf of the prime minister and the entire government that not a single person will be spared".

He said that the tragedy cannot be an "episode lasting merely a few days," as he called for accountability and for efforts to prevent such incidents in the future.

The minister warned against "suppressing the issue" and invited the House to work towards a way forward, agreeing to a proposal seeking the formation of a parliamentary committee comprising opposition members to investigate Wednesday's incident.

"Look at your resources, management and actions and then involve everyone to suggest a way forward," he said, assuring that the government will support such an approach.

"This is a matter of children's lives, and we are answerable to God for this. The ministry is nothing; we cannot run our afterlife for these ministries," he remarked.

At the outset of his address, the minister expressed sorrow at the lives lost in the incident.

"There can be no explanation for this. I am holding myself responsible, and I have presented myself to be held accountable."

He called for a holistic approach toward investigating the incident, urging that any committee formed to probe should not be "time-bound and should remain open".

"When you go investigate this incident, you will find so many things associated with it," he said, pointing to a larger "rot" within the sector.

Kamal held that the health sector was not "ideal".

"Four hundred thousand children between the ages of one and five die every year, 1,300 die every day, they are all dying preventable deaths," he said.

He continued: "It is not possible to bring back the infants who died at Pims, but let us look at it as a test from God and prevent the next kid from dying."

Kamal maintained that there was "no point" in making speeches if the government failed to learn from the incident.

"Start from me," Kamal said, offering himself up for accountability. "Sit with us and save the next from dying. I am putting the entire ministry at your disposal; every person will be answerable to you," he said.

He noted that the system was "rotten" and went on to say: "Where do I find a better person after removing an incompetent one?" Kamal said that when the day ended, "1,300 children would have died across the country".

Speaking about the inquiry committee's report on the incident, which he said would be presented by tonight, Kamal assured the House: "If you don't trust it, fair enough [...] we will listen to you."

The health minister once again reassured the House that, "No one will be spared, no matter how influential they are".

"We have to come up with a solution, and I am inviting you to guide us and [...] give us a strategic roadmap," he said. Kamal said that the health ministry would provide all the relevant input and information.

"Sit with us and find a way forward on how to prevent the next child from dying due to negligence within the resources that we have. I assure you of its implementation."

AI and Balochistan's Youth: How Universities Can Shape the Province's Digital Future

For Balochistan, the conversation around Artificial Intelligence is no longer about a distant future. AI is already changing education, healthcare, agriculture, industry, finance and governance. The real question is whether Balochistan's universities and young people will be prepared to participate in this transformation.

When Governor Balochistan and Chancellor of the province's public-sector universities, Jaffar Khan Mandokhail, addressed the Youth and AI Summit at the United Nations Headquarters in New York, his message carried significance beyond a discussion on technology. It placed Balochistan's youth, universities and technological ambitions within a global conversation about the future.

For a province with a predominantly young population, this is an opportunity that cannot be ignored. Balochistan's greatest advantage may not simply be its geography or natural resources, but the potential of its young people.

AI Is Already Changing the Landscape

Artificial Intelligence is rapidly becoming part of almost every major sector. For Balochistan, this transformation could offer practical solutions to some of its most persistent challenges.

AI and Data Science can support better healthcare decisions, improve agricultural monitoring, assist in analysing geological information, strengthen public services and contribute to more efficient use of resources.



But technology cannot transform a society on its own. It needs people who understand it, institutions that can develop it and universities capable of turning knowledge into practical solutions.

This makes higher education central to Balochistan's digital future. BUTEMS and the Beginning of a Shift

Balochistan University of Information Technology, Engineering and Management Sciences (BUTEMS) has introduced programmes in Artificial Intelligence and Data Science while incorporating emerging technologies and data-focused learning into different academic disciplines.

This development is significant because AI should not be treated as a field restricted to computer science. A mining engineer

who understands data analytics can better interpret geological information. An agricultural researcher can use AI to monitor crops. A healthcare professional can use data to identify trends and improve decision-making.

The real potential of Artificial Intelligence lies in its ability to strengthen almost every profession.

For Balochistan, the goal should therefore be to develop an academic environment where technology is used not simply to teach students, but to address real problems.

From Degree-Holders to Problem-Solvers

For decades, universities have largely focused on producing graduates for established professions. But the pace of technological change is making that approach increasingly inadequate.

Students entering the workforce today may encounter technologies, processes and even job roles that did not exist when they began their studies.

Universities must therefore teach more than professional knowledge. They must teach students how to learn, adapt, think critically, innovate and solve problems.

This is where AI and Data Science can become powerful tools. The objective should not simply be to produce graduates who know how to operate new technologies. It should be to develop young people capable of looking at a problem in their community and asking how technology, research and innovation can help solve it.

Balochistan's Challenges Can Become Research Opportunities

Such partnerships would allow academic knowledge to move beyond classrooms and become practical solutions for society.

The province itself provides a vast field for meaningful research. Water scarcity, mineral resources, agriculture, renewable energy, healthcare access, environmental change, urban planning and education all offer opportunities for technology-driven research.

Perhaps universities should therefore ask a different question. Instead of asking only, "What degree programmes should we offer?" they should also ask, "What problems can we help solve?"

That change in thinking could redefine higher education in Balochistan. Students of Artificial Intelligence and Data Science could work alongside engineers, doctors, economists, environmental scientists and social researchers. Universities could collaborate with government departments, industries, businesses and local communities.

The same applies to the idea of a paperless university. Digitalisation should not simply mean replacing paper files with computer screens. It should improve teaching, research, administration, information management and decision-making.

The ultimate goal should be universities that are digitally enabled, research-driven and connected to national and international networks.

Connecting Balochistan's Youth to the World

The Governor's participation in the United Nations Youth and AI Summit also highlights the importance of international engagement.

Around the world, universities are working to develop AI skills, expand research, create technology partnerships and prepare young people for the digital economy.

Balochistan's youth should have access to those opportunities.

International research collaborations, scholarships, technology partnerships, entrepreneurship programmes and knowledge networks can give students exposure beyond traditional academic boundaries.

At the same time, Balochistan's universities should aim to become contributors to global research rather than remaining only consumers of knowledge developed elsewhere.

Turning Vision into a Long-Term Strategy

The real challenge begins after the speeches and international headlines. Balochistan now needs a sustained strategy for AI education, Data Science, research,

innovation and digital transformation.

Its universities should work more closely with government, industry and communities.

Students should be given opportunities to work on real-world problems, develop startups and turn research ideas into practical projects.

The progress already visible at BUTEMS demonstrates that this direction is achievable and can contribute to a broader movement towards technology-driven higher education across the province.

Balochistan's Greatest Resource

Balochistan is frequently discussed in terms of its natural resources and vast geography. But its greatest long-term resource may ultimately be its people.

The province has a young population and talented students.

What is needed is an education system capable of turning that potential into opportunity.

If Balochistan can connect its universities, youth, Artificial Intelligence, Data Science, research and innovation, its young people will not merely be prepared for the future.

The message from New York should therefore be seen as an opportunity to think beyond individual programmes and towards a broader vision for higher education in Balochistan.

The province's next frontier may not be found only beneath its soil.

It may be found in its classrooms, laboratories, research centres and, above all, in the minds of its young people.

Balochistan's Education Crisis: Beyond Numbers and Empty Promises

The Balochistan government's claim that around 45,000 children have returned to schools is being presented as a major breakthrough in addressing the province's deep-rooted education crisis.

While any increase in enrollment deserves acknowledgment, this figure pales in comparison to the magnitude of the challenge. More than 3.1 million children in Balochistan remain out of school, a reality that exposes decades of neglect, mismanagement, and hollow commitments by successive provincial governments.

For years, education in Balochistan has been treated more as a slogan than a serious policy priority. Governments have consistently paid lip service to the issue, announcing plans, committees, and reforms that rarely translate into meaningful change on the ground.

The result is a broken system where thousands of schools remain without proper



buildings, forcing children to study under open skies or abandon education altogether.

Shelterless schools are not an exception but a norm across vast parts of the province.

Equally alarming is the issue of so-called "ghost teachers" and ineffective

staffing. Despite repeated claims of reforms under the School Based Re-

recruitment (SBK) system, absenteeism, political interference, and lack of accountability

continue to cripple public education. Reviewing recruitment processes is

important, but without strict monitoring and enforcement, such reviews risk becoming yet another bureaucratic exercise.

The return of 45,000 children to schools should not be used to mask the harsh truth: millions are still deprived of their fundamental right to education. Poverty, insecurity, poor infrastructure, and weak governance continue to push children out of classrooms and into labor, vulnerability, and hopelessness.

If the Balochistan government is serious about change, it must move beyond statements and statistics. Massive investment in school infrastructure, transparent teacher management, community-based enrollment drives, and sustained political will are essential.

Without tangible action, promises will remain empty, and another generation of Balochistan's children will be left behind. Education cannot survive on rhetoric alone; it demands urgent, honest, and decisive action.

BPSK Tehsildar Interviews Postponed Again, Leaving Candidates in Psychological Distress

QUETTA: The Balochistan Public Service Commission (BPSK) has once again postponed interviews for the posts of Tehsildar (B-16), leaving candidates frustrated, anxious and questioning the transparency of a recruitment process that was already underway.

The latest decision marks the second postponement of the Tehsildar interviews. More significantly, the Commission has halted the process after more than half of the scheduled interviews had already been conducted.

In a press release issued on Friday, BPSK said the ongoing interviews had been postponed "until further notice", citing directions conveyed to the Commission through an official communication dated August 27.

The Commission, however, did not announce a fresh schedule or provide candidates with a detailed explanation of why the interviews were stopped at such an advanced stage.

The BPSK website itself records an earlier postponement of the Tehsildar interviews in December 2025, highlighting that this is not the first disruption candidates have faced.

The latest postponement has caused considerable distress among candidates, particularly those who had already appeared for their interviews and those whose interviews were approaching.

Candidates say the repeated changes have made it extremely difficult to maintain focus and plan their personal and professional lives.

"This is not just a change of date for us. We have been preparing for months, and now, after more than half of the interviews have been completed, we are once again being told to wait indefinitely," a candidate said.

Another candidate described the situation as emotionally exhausting.

ing. "We prepared for the interview, appeared before the Commission and thought the recruitment process was finally moving towards completion."

Now there is no date, no timeline and no certainty. This uncertainty is putting enormous psychological pressure on candidates."

A third candidate questioned the decision to stop the process midway.

"If there was a reason serious enough to postpone the interviews, why was the process allowed to continue until more than half of the candidates had been interviewed? Candidates deserve an explanation."

"Until further notice" adds to anxiety.

The phrase "until further notice" has particularly alarmed candidates because it gives them no indication of how long the delay could last.

For aspirants who have already invested months preparing for the competitive recruitment process, another open-ended delay means remaining in a state of uncertainty over their careers.

Candidates argue that a public recruitment body should provide predictability, transparency and equal treatment, especially when interviews have already been conducted for a substantial number of candidates.

Candidates are now demanding that BPSK publicly clarify.

Why were the interviews postponed for a second time?

Why was the process stopped after more than half of the interviews had been conducted?

Will the interviews already conducted remain valid?

When will the remaining interviews resume?

Will the new schedule ensure equal treatment for candidates who have already appeared and those still waiting?

The issue is particularly sensitive because candidates who have already appeared for interviews are now left wondering whether the process they participated in will simply resume from where it stopped or whether further changes could affect the recruitment exercise.

Rather than leaving candidates to speculate, BPSK needs to provide a clear explanation and a definite timeline.

For aspirants who have already spent months preparing for one of the province's competitive government positions, an indefinite postponement is more than an administrative inconvenience, it is a prolonged source of career uncertainty and psychological stress.

PM Shehbaz urges Pakistan, Saudi Arabia to deepen economic, agricultural ties

NEWS DESK: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Friday said Pakistan and Saudi Arabia should focus on "deepening economic and agricultural ties" to "strengthen their longstanding relationship into a stronger trade and investment partnership, the Prime Minister's Office said.

Last year, Pakistan and Saudi Arabia signed a landmark "Strategic Mutual Defence Agreement", declaring that "any aggression against either country shall be considered an aggression against both". On August 7, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Turkey formalised their longstanding strategic relationship through the newly signed "Makkah Joint Defence Agreement", a trilateral security framework that its proponents describe as a defensive arrangement aimed at strengthening collective deterrence, enhancing military cooperation and promoting regional stability.

PM Shehbaz made the remarks during a meeting with Saudi Minister for Environment, Water and Agriculture Engineer Abdulmohsen Al-Fadley at the Prime Minister's House in Islamabad.

NA approves special probe for PIMS incident, Kamal vows no one responsible will be spared

NEWS DESK: Parliament on Friday unanimously approved the formation of a special committee to investigate the deaths of 14 newborns in a fire at Islamabad's Pakistan Institute of Medical Sciences (PIMS), with Law Minister Azam Nazeer Tarar proposing a joint parliamentary forum and Health Minister Mustafa Kamal vowing that "not a single person" responsible would be spared.

On early Wednesday morning, a fire broke out on the third floor of the Mother and Child Hospital at PIMS. Fifteen newborns were in the ward at the time. Fourteen suffered severe burns and later died, while one child survived and was rescued.

The deaths have renewed scrutiny of fire-safety measures at healthcare facilities, including the availability of firefighting equipment, emergency exits

Pakistan, Kuwait protocol agreement builds on 2023 defence pact

NEWS DESK: Pakistan and Kuwait signed the "Protocol Agreement 2026" to further strengthen bilateral defence cooperation, with sources describing the accord as an extension of an existing defence agreement between the two countries.

According to sources, the agreement reflected the longstanding "brotherly relations" between Pakistan and Kuwait and their shared commitment to deepening defence ties.

Sources said the protocol built upon the Agreement for Defence Cooperation signed in 2023, which was subsequently ratified by Kuwait in 2026.

The new agreement translated the longstanding trust be-



tween the two countries into stronger institutional and operational cooperation, sources said, adding that the relationship was also demonstrated during and after the First Gulf War.

The protocol provided a formal institutional framework for expanding defence cooperation, strengthening military-to-military linkages and enhancing en-

agement in areas including military training and deployment, according to sources. Sources stressed that the agreement was not linked to any other bilateral or multilateral arrangement and should be viewed exclusively within the framework of Pakistan-Kuwait defence relations.

Two more trains derail in Punjab, exposing railways 'infrastructure issues'

NEWS DESK: In yet another major accident, Yousafwala coal train derailed near Feroza Station between Khanpur and Liaquatpur after it ran into the sand dump on the loopline, apparently due to weak brakes or driver not applying brakes timely.

On the other hand, a passenger train (Rawal Express) derailed near Kala Gujran in Jhelum district on the Main Line-1 (Lahore-Rawalpindi) track, disrupting the railway operations.

In the first incident, 11 wagons of a goods train, along with its locomotive, derailed near Feroza Railway Station of tehsil Liaquatpur.

Reports said the goods train carrying coal for Sahiwal coal power plant was coming from Karachi when the accident happened.

11 wagons of Yousafwala coal train derailed near Liaquatpur, fourth crash involving the train in about two months; Rawal Express derailed near Jhelum

According to railway sources, the train, UP YSW-C 9042, loaded with 3,300 tonne coal, passed safely from Jetha Bhutta Railway Station at 12pm. But at 12:25, the guard received information that its 11 wagons had derailed near Feroza station. This was the fourth accident of the same coal train since July 10 this year. On July 10, the Yousafwala (Sahiwal) coal train derailed near Harappa station, blocking the upward rail traffic on the mainline. "The train operation, especially on the main line (within Multan, Sukkur and Karachi division) continues to be carried out since long without mitigating various operational issues, posing serious threats to safety of passengers, crew and infrastructure," an official source in the railways told Dawn.

"This is happening just because of the out-lived railway track, faulty rolling stock, human error and a couple of other issues," he added, demanding the
